

From the Manse



I wonder if you have spent the last few weeks glued to the Television?

Our screens have been full of many different sporting competitions – the tennis at Queens and Wimbledon, the Golf Open Championship at Portrush, the Test Cricket at Lords. If you are a football fan, maybe the Women's European Championships have been your choice or the UEFA Champions League Qualifiers? Or perhaps you like the speed and the noise of the Grand Prix?

There has certainly been plenty of sport to choose from.

Whether we play or not, and perhaps, especially if we have played in the past, sport inspires us, enthuses us, entertains us, and yes, frustrates us as well.

There is something about the challenge that excites us, and even if you know your football club is never going to win the Premiership or even the Championship League there is always the hope of just beating your long-term rivals.

In tennis and in golf we watch as players face over and again opponents they had played many times before, and also against new opponents they had never come across before, whose skills and strengths they are less sure of. And the same is true for every sport.

However, there are challenges in other spheres of life as well. In our school days, the challenge of gaining good exam results, and gaining entry into the college or university of our choice. Then comes the challenge of finding a job, and of working our way up the career ladder. Then might come the challenge of parenthood, or the challenge of fertility treatment, possibly with the eventual challenge of adapting to a life of childlessness.

The goalpost of retirement offers a different type of challenge, how best to fill your day, which charity or organisation to volunteer for, how to cope with the demands of caring for grandchildren, and elderly parents, sometimes both at the same time. Or the challenge of coping with deteriorating health or mobility, or simply just not being as able as you used to be.

There are other kinds of challenges too, some we set for ourselves, like a New Year resolution, a weight loss goal, a month off the booze, and the number of steps to walk in a day, or a week, or a month. I'm currently working towards targets set on my *Goodreads* app (other book apps are available!) in the *Summer Challenge*. I like doing this because it challenges me to read books about subjects, and in different styles of writing to what I would usually choose. I'm also 40 books into my yearly challenge of 60 books in the year — and I hope to be much closer to the end, by the end of my holiday.

Our Christian life offers different types of challenges too: the challenge to be faithful when others encourage us to go astray; the challenge to read your Bible and pray every day, when you might rather be doing other things; the challenge to apply the Bible's teachings to our daily life, to use it to guide us in what we do, and what we say; the challenge of becoming more like Jesus.

In my sermon on Sunday 20th July, the last day before I went on holiday, I issued a challenge to those of you who were there, which I now extend to everyone who reads this, and it is to pick up your Bible, your old favourite, or maybe a modern version you don't normally use, and read the story of Jesus again, as if for the first time.

Read one of the Gospels all the way through (not necessarily in the one sitting), read it as a story, and learn anew about Jesus. Maybe choose Mark – it's the shortest, or John if you want more of a challenge. Read it as a story, and imagine yourself being part of the story, being there, seeing the events happen. If you have the time and the motivation, read all four, and see the different stories each of the Gospel writers thought was important, and how some stories are told differently by different writers. None of this means the facts are wrong, just that different people tell

different stories in different ways. We can learn from them all.

Challenge yourself this summer, not just to take a rest from the routine of the year, but to so something different, to spend more time in God's word, or more time talking to him, or just resting in his presence, and I pray that you will be blessed as you do.

Choir

Choir Rehearsals will commence on Thursday 4th September at 7pm in the church café. Rehearsals only last 1 hour and involve singing through the hymns for the forthcoming Sunday morning worship and also rehearsing a choir anthem and sometimes introit for the same service. There is no requirement to read music. The only requirement is to come along and have fun while worshipping our Lord and Saviour.

Please do consider joining us, even one week to have a try. It is good fun and also good for your health in so many ways. Singing is a proven mood booster, and just 5 minutes a day will do the trick, according to research by the British Academy of Sound Therapy. As well as releasing feel-good endorphins, singing engages abdominal muscles, stimulates circulation and helps us to breathe more deeply, which can bring relief to some long-term lung conditions. Further research has also proved that singing can aid breathing issues caused by long COVID.

Have I convinced you yet? If not, then speak to me or any choir members please.

Session Report



At our last session meeting on 24th June we received an update on an inspection of all out electrical system and heard that there were historical and more recent problems that need to be repaired, some as a matter of urgency, at a cost of just under £10,000. Fortunately the church finances are in a reasonable state and we can go ahead with the work.

We also agreed to replace windows and back door of the manse but, thankfully, no electrical problems were identified there.

As you may be aware ROAR has ceased funding for the group which meets in St. Mark's but session has agreed to support their endeavours and the new arrangement will be Ralston Seniors Club. They will be affiliated to the church and safeguarding checks will be carried out on the management committee of the new venture to comply with church law.

Over the summer we have 2 joint services at Sherwood/Greeenlaw- on 27th July and 3rd August. Our proposed union is progressing slowly, but it is hoped that both kirk sessions will come together and agree a Basis of Union to allow the churches to unite by September 2026. Please keep this situation in your prayers.

We are taking part once again in the Ralston Community Games on 23rd August and the church will man the tea/coffee/baking stall as well as having a home baking section for takeaways. Any left over (some hope) will be on sale in the church after the service on 24th.

A letter from our prayer partner, Rev. Muriel Pearson, Church of Scotland Associate Minister in Tiberias.



Dear Friends,

For more than 600 days, wherever you are, you have watched horrified, feeling helpless, and angry, as the people of Gaza have been relentlessly attacked following the dreadful events of 7th October, 2023. Most Gazans have been displaced many times, famine is now a very real threat and the suffering is unimaginable.

In the West Bank, settlement expansion has been going on apace and settler violence has increased. Since 7th October there are 800 new checkpoints. Unemployment is about 80% and folks are beyond weary.

Israelis, too, are weary. Call-ups to reserve duty are repeated. The families of hostages have been pleading for a ceasefire and a return of their loved ones. More and more are dead.

Humanitarian aid to Gaza, never enough at the best of times, is now cynically in the hands of a private company which has no experience of distribution and many Gazans have been killed, desperate to feed their families.

Many Palestinians are held without charge in appalling conditions in Israeli prisons.

The international community has failed to find a way forward.

And then, on Friday 13th June, Israel attacked Iran, targeting scientists and military leaders and seeking to degrade Iran's capacity to enrich uranium and produce a nuclear bomb. Last night counterattacks from Iran led to alerts throughout the night. Those lucky enough to have shelters and secure

rooms spent the night there. As I write, I can hear air force jets overhead.

Worship was on Zoom on Sunday and will be until the state of emergency is relaxed.

Thank you for your messages of support and for your prayers.

Here are a few pointers:

- Pray for clear international consensus on a way forward which will lead to peace with justice for all.
- Pray for the most vulnerable, the children and the elderly, the injured and the sick; that aid will reach them quickly and plentifully.
- Pray for those bereaved and those held prisoner by a spirit of revenge.
- Pray for all working on the logistics of aid delivery, all those seeking diplomatic solutions, all those prepared to risk talking to the enemy.
- Pray that apathy and a feeling of helplessness will be replaced by a sense that everyone can contribute.
- Pray for the staff of our hotels and school, and our students and their families. Pray that kindness and unity in diversity will continue to shape their common lives and give hope that things can be different.
- Pray that Stewart (Rev. Stewart Gillan, Church of Scotland minister in Jerusalem) and I will be given wisdom and grace as we seek to minister here.
- Pray that God's love in all its abundance will be the hallmark of our communities and of our work.

Girl Guiding Appeal

Girl guiding in East District is in need of some help.

We have in the last year lost a unit at St Mark's, reducing the availability to girls aged 4-7.

With 2 units we could offer between 36-40 places for girls to have fun and join in guiding activities. We also lost 4 volunteers: 3 with the closure of the Tuesday Rainbows and 1 from the Wednesday Rainbows.

Our volunteer team managed up to thirty-one girls this year, but has decided to reduce numbers for the coming years. Thus the 2025/26 waiting list is now closed. Any enquiries will be redirected to nearby Cardonald units, as all three East district units currently have no availability.

The Rainbows waiting list for 2025/2026 is now open, but I think will be full very soon.

East district needs volunteers to share in guiding experiences with girls aged four and up.

Volunteers are needed to prevent another unit from closing in summer 2026, which would further limit opportunities for girls.

East District has three Rainbow units—1st North, 3rd East and 1st East —with a total capacity of 60 girls. We are in desperate need of volunteers to keep units open. There is a variety of roles volunteers can do within units and not everyone is a leader, but support is always welcome.

General Assembly

of the Church of Scotland 2025



As this year's General Assembly drew to a close, the Moderator, the Rt Rev. Rosie Frew, urged the Church to 'remember that God is able to do immeasurably more than all we ask or imagine'. In her closing address, Mrs Frew told the Assembly that the past week has been challenging, but also inspiring.

She said: "All of us - whatever the age and stage - have a shared vocation... And sometimes it can feel really hard. For most of us in this room, our whole Christian life has been lived out against the backdrop of decline. That line on the graph that's due to hit zero all too soon. The whole of my ministry, year on year. It can feel so dispiriting. And we see the reality of it as we look around our congregations and we're still one of the young ones..."

But she said there had been encouragement, having Lady Elish Angiolini as our Lord High Commissioner – such a positive message of unity and friendship. The involvement of our youth delegates. Young adults involved and invested and excited. The singing, the sharing of bread and wine, the conversations enjoyed, the friendships made. The contributions of so many people – honest, raw, questioning, encouraging. And the good news stories. And there are so many of them. People saying they've left this Assembly knowing so much more, and being so encouraged by what they've heard and seen.

In her closing speech, Lady Angiolini spoke of visits to Stirling, Dundee, the Central Mosque in Edinburgh and the Free Church of Scotland's General Assembly. She had taken part in services at St Giles' Cathedral and St Andrew's Roman Catholic Cathedral in Glasgow on the same day, which was a first for the Lord High Commissioner.

She told the Assembly: "I have genuinely loved witnessing your sincere and informed debates and engagement, peppered with good humour."

Assembly Trustees

'With heavy hearts', the Assembly Trustees introduce a report warning that 'the Church of Scotland is at a tipping point in terms of its financial viability' and 'needs to act now'.

While the 2024 financial results were not as bad as anticipated – an operating deficit of nearly £5.9m was £2.25m less than budgeted, due mostly to higher than expected investment income and legacies – initial calculations for the 2025 budget showed a deficit of £7.625 million. The Trustees report that they refused to approve this budget 'and instructed the Senior Leadership Team to come up with a further plan of action to significantly reduce the budgeted deficit and move towards a break-even position for 2027'.

Among the areas of work affected is the Seeds for Growth fund, which has seen its allocation for awards for the remainder of 2025 reduced from £2.2m to £500,000 (grants already agreed will be honoured). There has also been a voluntary exit scheme for staff from the national office, to be followed later this year by compulsory redundancies.

'Considerable work is being undertaken' towards a sustainable model for financing ministry, with proposals being developed for next year for implementation from January 2027. The principles underpinning the new model would include charges that can afford a full time minister being able to call, with provision made for those not able to meet the full cost. Presbytery income would come not from the national budget, as at present, but from local presbytery dues.

The church membership statistics make predictably grim reading, with total membership falling by about 14,000 to less than 245,000. This is the first time membership has dipped below 250,000,

and represents a drop of over 50,000 since 2020. The eldership has decreased by over 5000 people to 19,180 in the same period. There were 695 Professions of Faith in 2024, a fall of 65 compared to 2023, but higher than each of the three years before that.

The Church offices at 121 George Street are now 'housing a range of tenants' and generating 'at least £400k per annum income'.

The Business Committee brings proposals that the General Assembly should become a four-day event, from Friday to Monday, from next year. The proposed model includes a shortened opening ceremony and incorporates Holy Communion into closing worship on Monday afternoon. The Guild's Big Sing would take place on Saturday night, and the Moderator's Reception, Beating Retreat and Holyrood Palace reception on Sunday.

The committee predicts that the shortened Assembly will result in financial savings (estimated at £111,000 in 2026) as well as being easier to attend for elders of working age and Commissioners with family commitments.

Assisted Dying

The Joint Report of the Theological Forum and FAPLT on Assisted Dying examines the debate from a scriptural and theological perspective, as well as exploring issues around pastoral care, personal autonomy and 'slippery slope' concerns.

It concludes that the range of views in the Church – those who would continue to support opposition to assisted dying, those who would not choose it for themselves but 'recognise the ethical legitimacy of that choice for others' and those who would consider it for themselves – 'can all be held with theological integrity within the Church of Scotland'.

A list of areas on which Christians agree include that life is precious, fear of becoming a burden to loved ones should not be an acceptable reason for assisted dying, that legalising it is a 'serious step... with inherent risks' that must not be rushed, and that 'death is too much of a taboo subject in society'.

The Deliverance includes calls for the 'development of excellent palliative care services' and for 'robust safeguards' if assisted dying is legalised.

The convener of the **Safeguarding Committee** has warned the Church of Scotland not to be complacent on issues of safeguarding.

The Rev Dr Sonia Blakesley told the General Assembly that while the Kirk's Presbyterian structure meant that it was less vulnerable to the 'failures of leadership and lack of accountability' that contributed to the John Smyth abuse scandal in the Church of England (and which led to the resignation of Justin Welby as Archbishop of Canterbury), 'we can get better at this'.

And she warned that people must be aware of their duty to report concerns: "Too often priests and ministers and others are allowed to continue in abusive relationships because people do not want to believe that a church leader, a colleague, even a friend, would do the unthinkable...

Social Care Council (CrossReach Board)

The CrossReach report unveils a new five-year strategy, entitled 'Love from CrossReach'. The board states: "The strategy builds on 155 years of delivering care and support to the people of Scotland, in Christ's name, and as part of the Church of Scotland. It recognises that the way in which social care is designed and delivered is changing around us, and that we need to adapt and change with it. We have taken the opportunity to refresh our core purpose and set out a number of principles which will help the CrossReach Board to steer a steady course for the future, despite the acute challenges faced by CrossReach and the wider social care sector.





Our first evening will be on August 20th and every Wednesday following.


