From the Manse

Happy Advent!

This year Advent doesn't begin until the 3rd of December. This is the latest day it can ever begin on. This happens when Christmas Day falls on a Monday and so there are five Sundays within December, with Christmas Eve being the fourth of these. (2024 will follow a similar pattern when Advent begins on December 1st, but by 2025 we will be back to the more usual pattern of Advent beginning at the end of November.)

Whenever it starts, Advent is the four-week period running up to Christmas and is traditionally a time of preparation, a time of contemplation before the birth of Jesus Christ, and also a time of anticipation of his return to earth in glory. For many of us, the weeks leading to the Christmas season fly by in a flurry of activities, and for some Christmas is the most stressful time of the year. It can be a time of contrasting emotions, we can be eager yet frazzled, sentimental yet indifferent, excited and yet can't be bothered with it all. One minute we look forward to going out with family and friends, later we feel lonely; our excitement can be tinged with dread, our anticipation loaded with worry and concern.

Even those who genuinely love Christmas can often miss its point. Content with candles and carols, and good food, we bask in the warmth of familiar traditions, watch the Christmas movies, and enjoy the feelings of general goodwill. How many remember the harsh realities of Jesus' birth? The dark and dank stable, the closed door of the inn? How many of us share the longing of the prophets, who foresaw Christ's birth centuries before he was born?



Now, I'm not saying we should do away with all the trimmings, I love Christmas as much as the next person, but this Advent I encourage you to take some time to remember the true message of Christmas. Let God be the God of your life, let him be the most important thing. Work to have the attitude of Christ, described in the Christ hymn in Philippians chapter 2:

“ He always had the nature of God, but he didn't think that by force he should try to remain equal with God. Instead of this, of his own free will he gave up all he had and took the nature of a servant. He became like a human being and appeared in human likeness. He was humble and walked the path of obedience all the way to death – his death on the cross. For this reason, God raised him to the highest place above and gave him the name that is greater than any other name”.
(*Philippians 2:6-9*)

I do think it is amazing, that at a time when the church has lost its relevance to so many, the whole world stops at Christmas to mark the birth of God's own son. Across the globe Christmas is celebrated, by Christians, Sikhs, Hindus, Muslims, so many people have adopted some of the traditions of Christmas whether they claim to believe in Jesus or not. So many people stop, for a moment to mark, whether they realise it or not, the biggest, most important day the world has ever known: the day God the Son, came to live among us.

One day, in the future, his name will be worshipped by all mankind. He will be respected and honoured as he deserves:

“And so, in honour of the name of Jesus, all beings in heaven, on earth, and in the world below, will fall on their knees and all will openly proclaim that Jesus Christ is Lord to the glory of God, the Father.” (*Philippians 2:10-11*)

Until that day comes, even as we prepare the cards, the presents, and the food for the Christmas season, we look forward to Christ's birth and to his second coming.

Let God be God of your life, not Christmas itself. Use Christmas as an opportunity to put your faith into action, to share friendship and fellowship, to care for others, to show love, in Christ's name.

Let Us Remember Service.

(Sunday 3rd December 4pm)

This is a special service to remember those we have lost in the previous year, and at any time in the past. With hymns, readings and times of reflection we stop before the busyness of Christmas to remember together. The list of those who have died this year will be read out, and I would like to add to this the names of others whom you are remembering, (Christian names only).

There have been fewer funerals this year, and there may only be a few families attending, so I would encourage you to consider if this is a service to which you could come along.

Session Report



At the session meeting on 29th August we learned that most church activities are restarting with the various organisations commencing their winter sessions. We are grateful to have so many activities going on in our premises.

Our church worker, Peter, continues with his contribution to the support of young people with a successful *Junction* event and continuing *TRASH* evenings. There was also a good turn out at recent *Messy Church*.

The Green Team continue their works and thanks are due to Jack Goodall and his team for the garden and Andy Grant for lighting changes in the church ; not forgetting the excellent work of Ann and Graeme Black in maintaining the grounds.

The repairs to the manse walls have been completed, but there is still a little work to be carried out on the roof. Hopefully soon. Plaster work in church should also be completed soon.

The church café still awaits a business plan and we expect this soon to allow us to progress the work already completed.

We have been offering hospitality to the Church of the Nazarene and Kingdom Ambassadors who have both recently lost access to their previous premises. They visit on Sunday afternoons.

We are glad to report that Fiona in the office has returned to work, with her crutches, and we are grateful for her return.



We are pleased to announce that Julie Wright has agreed to take on the role of Church Treasurer. We are confident she will do an excellent job and will have a willing team of helpers to support her in this new undertaking.

We were surprised to be served with a tree preservation order by the council. It took a few emails to get full details, but it applies to the two beech trees at the front of the church on Glasgow Road. It was initiated by a helpful, non-member of our congregation. We have a copy of the tree inspection for our records and are assured that at the moment these trees are in an acceptable condition.

We have just learned that Rev. John Murning of Sherwood has indicated he will retire on 14.2.24. We were supposed to have a joint meeting with them on 7th November, but they cancelled this. Our understanding is that Presbytery will step in when John retires, appoint an interim moderator and then we can progress things thereafter.

We are also in negotiation with the council to have Christmas lights installed on the two larger trees at the north-east corner of our grounds. We hope they can help with this.

The young people hosted the Tearfund Big Quiz in November and raised £350.15. Thank you to everyone who came along. We hope you had a fun night of quizzing.



39thA Paisley Brownies



Saint Nicholas

Saint Nicholas of Myra (traditionally 15 March 270 – 6 December 343), also known as **Nicholas of Bari**, was an early Christian bishop of Greek descent from the maritime city of Myra in Asia Minor, (now known as Demre, in modern-day Turkey) during the time of the Roman Empire. Because of the many miracles attributed to him, he is also known as **Nicholas the Wonderworker**.

Saint Nicholas is the patron saint of sailors, merchants, archers, repentant thieves, children, brewers, pawnbrokers, unmarried people, and students in various cities and countries around Europe. His reputation, evolved following his legendary habit of secret gift-giving, gave rise to the traditional model of **Santa Claus**.

Little is known about the historical Saint Nicholas. The earliest accounts of his life were written centuries after his death and probably contain legendary elaborations. He is said to have been born in the Greek seaport of Patara, Lycia, in Asia Minor to wealthy Christian parents.

In one of the earliest attested and most famous incidents from his life, he is said to have rescued three girls from being forced into prostitution by dropping a purse of gold coins through the window of their house each night for three nights so their father could pay a dowry for each of them.




Other early stories tell of him calming a storm at sea, saving three innocent soldiers from wrongful execution, and chopping down a tree possessed by a demon. In his youth, he is said to have made a pilgrimage to Egypt and Palestine, where he lived near the site of the Nativity. Shortly after his return, he became Bishop of Myra. He was later cast into prison during the persecution of Diocletian, but was released after the accession of Constantine.

An early list makes him an attendee at the First Council of Nicaea in 325, but he is never mentioned in any writings by people who were at the council.

Fewer than 200 years after Nicholas's death, the St. Nicholas Church was built in Myra under the orders of Theodosius II over the site of the church where he had served as bishop, and his remains were moved to a sarcophagus in that church. He is frequently portrayed on icons in the Eastern Orthodox Church often shown as an elderly man, with a short white beard, balding head wearing in Bishop's robes.

St Nicholas predated the Celtic saints by many centuries, but is seasonally appropriate. His feast day is 6th December, the date of his death, and traditionally those who leave their shoes out for St Nick on that day will find a coin inside them in remembrance of his frequent secret gift-giving.

How to pray for Israel and Gaza



The crisis in Gaza and Israel is escalating and has already devastated thousands of lives. You can use this prayer guide to call out to God in intercessory prayer, which simply means praying on behalf of someone else. God hears your prayers. You can trust him with them.

What to pray...

Pray for peace

- Pray for an immediate ceasefire and an end to the violence.
- Pray for world leaders with influence in the region to make wise decisions that lead to lasting peace.
- Pray that God's peace would fill the hearts and minds of everyone who is suffering as a result of this conflict.

Pray for safety

- Pray for all civilians – that God would protect them from harm, particularly the most vulnerable, including children, older people, and people with disabilities.
- Pray for humanitarian workers – for protection for those who are working to provide humanitarian assistance and medical supplies.
- Pray for safe access to food, water, sanitary items, medical supplies, fuel and electricity.
- Pray for people forced to flee their homes – pray for safe places to stay and that they will be able to return home.

Pray for strength

- Pray for church leaders – for wisdom and strength to lead people through fear and uncertainty. Pray for bravery as they guide their communities and offer loving support.
- Pray for Christian communities and faith leaders across the region – for unity, connection and mutual understanding so that they can help bring people together and show kindness.
- Pray for humanitarian workers – that God would strengthen their resolve and ability to provide relief and humanitarian assistance.

Pray for hope

- Pray for those who are terrified, mourning and suffering in Israel and Gaza. Ask God to save them from despair – for the trauma and violence they've experienced not to overshadow hope.
- Pray that people in Gaza and Israel and those in the wider region wouldn't lose hope that peace is possible.

Pray for healing

- Pray for people who have been traumatised or injured; ask God to heal their physical and emotional wounds and bring them deep comfort.
- Pray for hospitals and medical workers who are struggling with limited resources and overwhelming needs. Ask God to provide all the resources and equipment they need to treat the sick and injured.


