From the Manse

During a busy and exciting Advent, we thought about the Love of God coming to earth in the incarnation of Jesus, and we thought about the implications of this for our lives, particularly in the way we show God's love to others. We put this into practice as we gave gifts for the mothers and children supported by Women's Aid Renfrewshire, toiletries for the refugees at the Watermill, and gave financially to the Christian Aid Christmas appeal, and to the Renfrewshire Foodbank at the Christmas Services. Thank you to everyone who contributed to any or all of these appeals.

We celebrated the birth of Jesus with much fun at the Nativity, featuring a few children and several adults who were brave enough to join in, and even agreed to be dressed up. We participated in an interactive telling of the Christmas Story on Christmas Eve, and even heard the same story retold totally differently using many crisp packets on Christmas morning – sadly they were only in photographic form, I didn't want to spend the whole of December searching out the nearly 30 packets of crisps required.

On Sunday 29th December, we worshipped at Sherwood Greenlaw in a joint service thinking about new beginnings, both for the New Year, and thinking ahead to being a new church when the two churches unite. The following week Rev. Tom Cant led us in a joint service of worship in St Mark's, and spoke about the changing face of the church, and helpfully about the ebb and flow of life in the church and attendance at church.

Over the next few months expect to hear about more joint services, and joint social events for the two congregations to get to know each other, as we work towards the goal of uniting as the joint congregation of Paisley East. There is no set timeline yet, although I hope within the next month or two we will have a clearer idea of key dates in the process. Representative groups of elders from the two congregations have already met and will meet again after both Kirk Sessions have met



independently in January. We will endeavour to keep you informed as we work through the process. There are big decisions to be made, and a formal vote will need to be made by all members on the decision to unite.

As we move forward, we do so in uncertain times, there are no quarantees about the future of the church, about the financial situation, about the number of members. old and new, attending churches. What is certain is that we don't do it all in our own strength; we don't even do it as a combined force of the people of St Mark's and Sherwood Greenlaw, we do it as disciples of Jesus. Throughout the last two millennia the way ahead has often been challenging for those who follow Jesus. He does not guarantee that the way will be easy, in fact in the Bible Jesus often says the very opposite, but he does promise to be with us, and to be the way, the truth and the life.

As we move forward, we do so keeping our eves fixed on Jesus, and on the mission he calls us to be part of : his work here in the world. We recognise that he calls us, he equips us, and he walks along side us. He will not forsake us, and will always, as the old hymn says, be our friend. We face the uncertainty of the future in the strength of Jesus, the baby in the manger, who became the greatest leader the world has ever known, the one whose word is the bestselling book around the world, year by year, and always has been. We can confidently put our trust in him, place our hand in his, knowing that he will guide us, and bless us and work through us as we walk with him into 2025.

May you know his blessings in your life in 2025.

As most of you will be aware there has been a lot of restructuring in the Church of Scotland and our local presbytery has instituted a local plan. With a dwindling number of ordained ministers and falling congregation numbers, it has been decided that ourselves and Sherwood/Greenlaw church will form a union.

No definite date has been set for this to happen, but it is likely to be within the next couple of years. With this in mind, a small group from each congregation has met to discuss the way forward.

Nothing has been decided as matters have to be agreed by the individual kirk sessions but there is a general feeling of a willingness to have joint working with eventual progression to a union. Our Christmas season was a successful time in the church with our *Treemendous* event and joint services with Sherwood and ourselves.

It was good to see both places well attended and a lot of folk getting together to worship.

As always I am extremely grateful to all the members who work behind the scenes to keep the church going: serving in the café; helping with the various organisations; preparing food; teaching in Evolution; helping with creche; providing transport; doing door duty and helping at ROAR. Thank you all.

This is simply for information and we will keep the members well acquainted with developments.

The flowers are accompanied by a card (hand-made by Sheena Tonner), suitable for the occasion. The flower team consists of Isobel Higgins, Kate McLaughlin and June Chapman.

Car Run

Myra McKellar is responsible for organising the car run. Volunteer drivers bring to church those people who are still mobile but find walking any distance a problem.

Hospitality

Twice a year an afternoon tea is organised for those in the congregation who are over eighty, housebound or in care homes. The teas provide an opportunity to meet up with old friends, chat, share in worship and enjoy a sing-along.


The Haven

Christmas Gifts


Each Christmas, gifts and cards go out to members who are over eighty, housebound or in care homes. This vital part of pastoral care is organised by Alison Christie.






At the end of the year we said congratulations and goodbye to Connie, who received her Gold Award, having achieved all six themes, and wished her well as she moves on to Guides.


