From the Manse



As many of you will know, I have just returned from a busy four days in Edinburgh as a Commissioner at the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland. This annual gathering of our church decides the policies and programmes of importance for the year ahead, and agrees, or disagrees with the proposals of the different committees that make up and organise our church. It is also a time to catch up with colleagues, meet new friends, and have informal discussions aside from the main business of the day.

The weekend began with the installation of the new Moderator, Right Rev. Gordon Kennedy, minister of Craiglockhart Parish Church in Edinburgh. Curiously, he has a local connection, having attended Crookston Castle Secondary School before going to Glasgow University to study Civil Engineering. After this, he worked for Strathclyde Regional Council in the Roads Department before returning to University to study Divinity. Before Craiglockhart, he served as minister in New Cumnock Parish Church in East Ayrshire and Portpatrick Parish Church linked with St Ninian's Parish Church in Stranraer, Wigtownshire, (now Dumfries and Galloway).

One of the highlights of the Assembly, for me, is the daily worship. The singing is fabulous – whether it is to the wonderful organ, unaccompanied but led by the Precentor, or accompanied by a solo guitarist. At one point, during Monday's Communion service, there was a fault with the audiovisual and the words of the second verse of *Ye Gates* were not displayed. It did not matter, the Assembly carried on singing in full voice.

Gordon chose as his theme for his year *Walk in all his ways* Deuteronomy 10:42, followed by the words of Jesus saying, 'I am the way'.

He reminded us that we cannot save the Church of Scotland through our own hard work, no matter how hard we try, but that we know someone who can, King Jesus. He used the example of someone carrying a walking stick around with them, rather than leaning on it. He pointed out that there are followers of Jesus who think they should carry Jesus around, that they carry the cross, rather than leaning on Jesus, leaning on the cross, and walking in the victory of the cross. Jesus has already won the victory for us when he died on the cross for us, and there isn't anything better than this. The good news is that King Jesus has won, King Jesus is winning, and King Jesus will always win. Nothing in all creation can prevail against him, and his victory sets us free from the burden of human plans. It sets us free to walk in the ways of Jesus, the way of compassion and love, welcoming friends and strangers, and caring for creation.

This is the message I have brought home from across the Assembly reports and debates. We tend to talk too much about Church, (and we did a lot of that at the General Assembly). We should be talking more about Jesus, talking about how he is relevant in our lives, about the difference walking with him makes, and as we live out our faith in him, we grow our trust in him when we commit ourselves to him, and 'walk in all his ways'.

My prayer is that we can all walk in all his ways together, as we grow more like Jesus by following him, following him into the future he has ordained for us, a life of love and community and care because he loved us first.

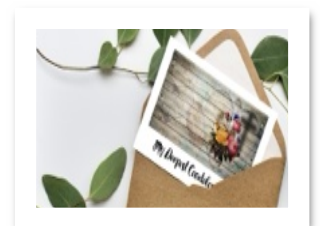

We had a very successful Plant Sale and grateful thanks are due to Jen Morgan for her organisation of this event. The Bake Sale was also in operation and was sold out.

Our Saturday Café worked hard and helped contribute to church funds. We are pleased to intimate that a new staff member has been recruited: Josie,

who will be in charge on Thursdays and will give Meena some time to collect her thoughts. As ever, we are grateful to the volunteers who assist in food preparation and serving in the café itself. You are all doing a fantastic job.

Most of you will not be aware of all the things that happen in our building which help establish us as a community hub : the work Peter does with the young people supported by an excellent team of volunteers at Junction, Messy Church, the Easter Club and school assemblies ; the groups who use our church halls and find them a welcoming space : Little Kickers ; Sweaty Mamas ; Ralston Seniors Club ; BB ; Anchor Boys ; Guides and Brownies.

There is also a small team of experts who, with their technical knowledge, enable us to save large sums of money when they repair damaged pipes, leaking toilets and dodgy electrics without need of commercial firms.

I've said it before and will say it again that we are blessed with a loyal team of helpers who always give of their best to enable the church to run smoothly. Many thanks.

General Assembly Report 2026



General Assembly 2026 was made up of around 400 members, roughly a 50/50 split of elders and ministers, with some church staff, and around 100 of these attended online. We met each day for worship before the business of the day began.

Friday 15th May:

We welcomed the Lord High Commissioner, Lady Elish Angiolini, before installing the Rev. Gordon Kennedy as Moderator, and then, after the formalities of introducing and welcoming the International and Ecumenical visitors, the business really began.

The report from the *Legal Questions Committee* enabled the passing of two amendments to the *Safeguarding Act* and the *Discipline Act*. The *Assembly Trustees Report* included information on a new framework for financing ministry. This was for information on what is guiding thinking, with a definitive proposal to be brought to the 2027 General Assembly. There is no change to *Giving to Grow* for 2026. There was encouragement for congregations to engage with the *Stewardship Team* and the *Bearing Fruit – a financial health-check for growth* online financial health check. The Scots Hotel in Tiberias, Israel, will be leased to a private partner to help with sustainability and development. The *Report of the Faith Action Programme Leadership Team* and the *Theological Forum on Church Decline: Reflecting on the Causes and Building a Better Future* is commended for Congregations to read, study and consider the recommendations so our Kirk Session will review this in due course.

The report on *Clyde Presbytery* by the *Presbytery Review Committee* was received, and in the last report of a long day, I reported on the work of the *Safeguarding Committee* and its new proposals to improve support for those affected by domestic abuse within church manses.

Saturday 16th May:

The FAPLT (Faith Action Programme Leadership Team) discussed how Priority Areas are supported, and the parish re-adjustments affecting demography and geography. Much discussion took place over the change in *Ministry Education*, and the shift to one academic partner (*Glasgow University*) instead of 5, and the process of making that change, before the Assembly supported the move. The Church approved its *Apology for the Legacies of Slavery*, another Joint Report, on behalf of the *Faith Action Programme Leadership Team*, the *Assembly Trustees*, and the *Theological Forum*. A new group will now be set up to discuss appropriate reparations to the victims of slavery. The day ended with the report from the Guild.

Sunday 17th May:

The Assembly met for worship in *St Giles Cathedral*, where Rt Rev. Gordon Kennedy preached the sermon. Business recommenced in the afternoon as we heard from *Crossreach*, (the *Social Care* arm of the *Church of Scotland*), the *Ecumenical Relations Committee*, the *Registration of Ministries Committee*, and the *Iona Community*.



Holiday Club



During the Easter holidays we ran a very successful Holiday Club – *Going Bananas* at which we looked at stories from the Bible about people who did things others might have thought was ‘bananas’ as they followed God.

During the week we had 112 different children come along with 85 on the busiest day and an average attendance of 74. It was a fun and busy week with each morning packed with different activities. It was great to have the halls packed with children having a lot of fun and making a lot of noise.

On the Saturday, at the end of the Holiday Club, we had a family event with some crafts and challenges. We had a good turn out of families to the event and a fun afternoon was had by all.

We had a total of 32 people who helped during the week or in the preparations for holiday club. I would like to thank all of them and everyone who prayed for the holiday club.

The Junction Youth Café **the JUNCTION** @ A mark 7

The two separate groups of *Junction* are back up and running after the Easter holidays. We have had a number of new people join both groups and between the two groups we have about 35 young people coming along regularly.

The Junction will finish for the summer in June but we plan to run the *Summer Junction* during the last week of the school holidays again this year.



Ralston Primary School



The links between the school and the church continue to grow and it is great that we can work with the school.

I was away with 62 of the P7s to Lockerbie Manor for their residential week. The weather was good and they were outdoors most of the days doing canoeing, kayaking, climbing, abseiling, zip wire, orienteering, fencing and axe-throwing to mention a few. And one evening they went up the hills behind the manor for lovely views of Lockerbie, the Solway and even the Lake District.

It is a busy four days for the young people and long days for them – it wasn't helped by some of them being up and dressed ready for breakfast at 5.25am! That was just the first morning ; the other mornings they were much later.

The P1s were down at the *Ralston Seniors Club* in May and the *Reading Leaders* will be back down in June. In June we will also be welcoming the upper school to the church for the *P7s Leavers Service*.

There will be more change in the school with the head teacher retiring at the summer. So please pray for the school in this time of change.

The last couple of months have seen the Brownies busy working on the programme along with fun activities.

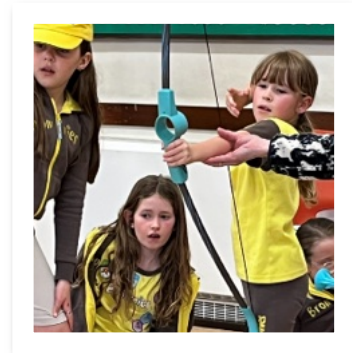
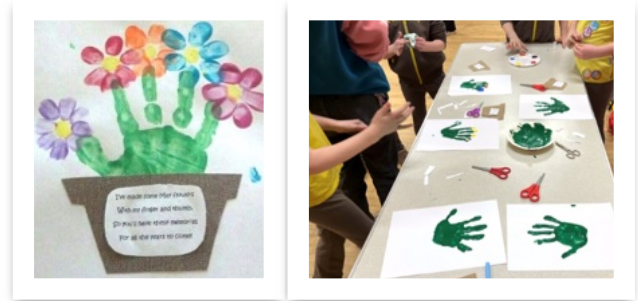
We had a messy evening when we made a gift for *Mother's Day*. It involved paint and hands – need I say more? The Brownies loved making this gift!

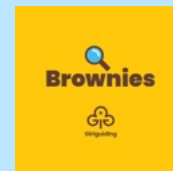

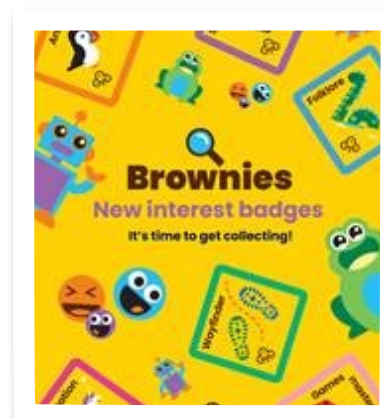
As a result of completing these themes, Aoife and Eve gained the Silver Award. Well done!

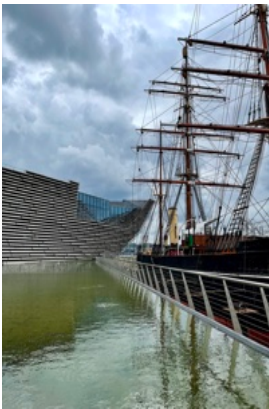
