From the manse

In recent days I have been enjoying having breakfast, lunch, or maybe just a cuppa whilst sitting in the manse garden. Now admittedly it's not all been in brilliant sunshine, and sometimes I have needed a fleece on, but I have been enjoying being outside in the fresh air. Rarely do I take my laptop outside, but I like to read, or eat out there. I particularly have enjoyed sitting outside and chatting with other people, which feels such a treat after the last year.

I hope you are taking time to enjoy your gardens, not just being busy working in them. I admit that I find a sense of satisfaction in a newly mown lawn, or freshly weeded flower bed, but the thing that makes my heart sing is the colours. Pinks from the heather and the African daisies, blues in the lavender and cornflowers, and yellows and orange from the marigolds (kindly provided for me by one of the green-fingered experts in our congregation.)

- When I sit and ponder in the garden, or just rest I feel God's peace. *"And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus."* (Philippians 4:7)
- When I weed the garden, I ponder the variety of plants he has created – and sometimes I wonder why the gardens grow weeds so easily and not beautiful flowers? But then I remember: *"So the earth produced all kinds of plants, and God was pleased with what he saw."* (Genesis 1:12)
- When I sit and absorb the warmth of the sunshine I am reminded of the warmth of God's love. *"For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only Son that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life."* (John 3:16)
- When I seek shade under the apple tree, I am reminded that God shelters me, *"The Lord is your shade at your right hand, the sun will not harm you by day, nor the moon at night."* Psalm 121:5-6.

As part of a 'Citizen science' project we will soon be identifying and measuring the trees on our church land (more details in another article). But it got me thinking, we can measure the girth of a tree, and even its height, but how do you measure the roots? (We are NOT being asked to do this!) We can't, but we know that young trees have shallow roots,

and mature trees have roots deep within the soil and can better withstand the storms.

The Bible uses this example to talk of our Christian life and faith. *“They are like trees planted by streams of living water, that yields their fruit in season and their leaves do not wither, whatever they do prospers.”* (Psalm 1:3)

How do we measure the depth of our roots? Well I don’t know that we can, and it doesn’t matter. But what is important is **where** we find our strength each day. God wants us to be deeply rooted in him. He knows that if we seek his living water, we will become more deeply rooted, and better able to withstand the trials of life.

“Since you have accepted Christ Jesus as Lord, live in union with him. Keep your roots deep in him, build your lives on him, and become stronger in your faith, as you were taught. And be filled with thanksgiving.” (Colossians 2:6-7)

May we be like the trees that thrive by the streams of living water.
May we thirst for that living water, drawing closer to God and getting to know him better by reading his word, and by talking to him and listening to him.

May we give thanks for God’s blessings in our lives and hand our troubles to him,
and may our roots grow deeper, as we do.

I hope you all enjoy the summer, whether at home or away, on your own or with family and friends, may you feel the warm of God’s love, share his peace and grow your roots deeper,

Environment Team

Caring for creation was a key theme at this year's General Assembly. One of the five key points (called the Marks of Mission) is '*to strive to safeguard the integrity of creation and sustain and renew the life of the earth*'. The previous two General Assemblies recognised that the earth is facing a climate emergency. This time we are being encouraged to actively work towards a 'just and green future' and to play our part as Scotland aims to reach Net Zero by 2030.

At the June Kirk Session meeting it was agreed that we would form a team to consider various environmental issues to do with the church, our grounds, and our lifestyles. The group has yet to meet, and would welcome anyone else to join. Our first task is to complete a 'Citizen Science' project called "Our Trees". It is being organised by Napier University in conjunction with the Church of Scotland and we are being asked to identify, record and measure the trees on our land – both the land around the church and the manse. This is to be completed by the end of July. Then we will complete the 'Church Check-up' provided by Eco-congregations Scotland and decide what our first steps should be.

In the meantime, Jok Everett has already found out about a scheme to provide free trees for us to plant in our gardens, and he will write separately about this.

I look forward to working on this important venture in many different ways. More info to follow in future magazines.

Covid Vaccination and Christian Aid

The Church of Scotland is partnering with Christian Aid to support people across the world who do not have access to a Covid-19 vaccine. As well as advocating for a just vaccine rollout, Christian Aid works with vulnerable communities, helping to limit the impact of the virus on health, livelihoods and personal safety.

Lord Wallace, Moderator of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland is urging people to join him in supporting the appeal and helping vulnerable people stay safe as they wait for the vaccine. Your donation can save lives.

Lord Wallace writes: It has been much on my mind as to how fortunate I have been to have received my two vaccinations; but had I been living elsewhere in the world, the story would have been quite different. In my year as Moderator, the plan is to visit Lebanon and Malawi. Just taking these two places as examples, the percentage of population vaccinated with only one vaccination is 4% and 0.8% respectively.

The World Health Organisation have said no-one is protected until all are protected, therefore we are urging the UK Government to do all that it can to ensure COVID-19 vaccines are available throughout the world. Alongside this we must also seek to limit the impact of the virus on health, livelihoods, and personal safety, for those in the poorest parts of the world. By supporting Christian Aid in their efforts to provide basics such as soap, water, and food, we can ensure that vulnerable communities stay safer as they wait for vaccination.

In this very tangible way, as we seek global justice, here is a practical opportunity to give real expression in 2021 to loving our global neighbours. I sincerely hope that you will join with me and together we will respond generously, as a mark of our gratitude for what we have received.

Peter's News

We have been continuing to meet up with the young people of Trash over the past few months. Since June we have been able to meet up inside, however, the weather on a Sunday night has been so nice recently that we have been outside on the church lawn. We have been playing croquet, giant connect four, scavenger hunts and other activities including a water fight. We have had one night inside which felt much more like a "normal" trash night with pool, table tennis, table football and some other organised games. Over the past few months we have been looking at the different genres of the bible and how understanding the genre can help understand better the story of the bible. We will continue to meet during the summer on weeks when the majority of the young people will be there.

We are planning on going to Teen Ranch in September and hoping that we will be able to stay for the weekend. If restrictions do not allow us to do that, we will go up for the day like we did last year.

During the summer holidays I am hoping for the church to run a holiday club during the last week of the school holidays. I am preparing for this with the current regulations which state that a maximum of 30 people can be in the building at one time. This will mean that we will have to restrict the number of children able to attend and reduce the number of helpers.

I am also hoping to run The Junction for the older primary school and younger high school age group possibly during the same week as holiday club. This was very successful the last time we ran this two years ago and we hope the young people would be keen to come along to it again. We will also need to keep up to date with current regulations on whether that type of youth work is allowed.

The streaming of the church services and making up of CDs and DVD is still continuing even with us meeting back up in person. There is still a need for this as we are getting anywhere from 60 to 120 views on the Sunday service with about 20 watching the service live. I do need to train up some people on how to run the cameras so that there is a pool of people able to do it. I have a few willing volunteers but do let me know if you are wanting to also be involved with this.

On a personal note I am reducing my hours at St Mark's from August as I am returning to teaching. I am going to be working in a secondary school maths department in Gourock two days a week when they return from the summer holidays.

I look forward to what will hopefully be happening over the summer and what the change of restrictions might allow us to do more come August.

Eco Committee

One idea is to plant a tree in every front garden in Ralston later this year, for wildlife and to clean the air we breathe.
