From the Manse

As the days lengthen, and the sun shines more (ok - accompanied by the recent April showers) I was reminded of a poem by Rev Katy Owen, a retired minister and member of the Iona community.

"God of all seasons In the dreich, wet, cold and windy days of winter, Our spirits long for the warmth and comfort of spring.

As the sun revives

And brings life to the whole of creation

So we long to be part of that renewal and rebirth.

Hear our prayer for the re-awakening of hope and love and peace In ourselves and in the world.

And hear our songs of gratitude and praise As we join together with one voice In the universal song of love."

Last Sunday afternoon I was able to visit my sister and her family and sit out in their garden enjoying the sunshine. We absorbed the warmth and comfort of the sunshine and enjoyed being together again – for the first time in four months. Many such reunions are happening across the country as we all have the opportunity to meet up with friends and family again. Hearts are full of joy, and relief, and yet there are many families, my own included, where the reunion makes us remember those who are no longer with us.

This year, more than ever, I think we are aware of the re-awakening of hope and love and peace across the world as our Covid restrictions ease. In Scotland, shops have reopened, and gyms and swimming pools. We can meet friends for coffee once again. However, all is not peace and hope. India is currently in the midst of a horrendous situation; its health care services totally unable to cope with the numbers of people seriously ill with Covid. Many parts of the world have still to begin a vaccination programme. And climate change has dropped off the international agenda.

Sometimes it feels we are powerless in the face of adversities like these, and yet small steps can make a difference. We have learnt to wear a face mask and use hand sanitiser almost automatically now. We take our reusable shopping bags with us to the supermarket. We recycle our cardboard, even if our blue recycle bin has got a lot fuller with our online deliveries this last year. Each little step we take makes a difference.

This month finds us in Christian Aid week again. There will be no coffee mornings or cake sales and any sponsored events will take place quietly, individually, like the Moderator, Martin Fair walking along the banks of the Tay on Saturday as part of the Kilt Walk weekend. Our Service on Christian Aid Sunday (9th May) will be focused on Christian Aid, and I aim to have a Climate Sunday service before the COP26 conference begins in November. Climate change is not something that just affects people in far off places, costal levels will change around Scotland too, increasing acidity of the seas is already affecting some Scottish businesses, and our marine wildlife is suffering. And the conference of world leaders is happening on our very doorstep. I believe it is important for us as Christians not just to pray for hope and love and peace across the world, but to do what we can to make it happen. Bringing love to our own little corner, and doing what we can to help our brothers and sisters across the world.

The Bible is full of references to the environment in which we live, from the creation stories of the beautiful Garden of Eden and the plethora of wildlife that was created there, the rainbow shown to Noah after the first great flood, the vines, the sheep, the fig tree, and the lilies of the field that Jesus used as examples, and many, many more. God created the world and "God looked at everything he had made, and he was very pleased." (Gen 1:31) God gave humankind the responsibility to look after the earth and all its creatures, and charged us with the responsibility to 'love our neighbour.' (Leviticus 19:18, and Matt 22:39). I fear God will not be 'very pleased' when now looking at the mess humankind has made of his beautiful planet.

We pray for a re-awakening of hope, love, and peace across the world, and we need to work to make it happen. We have seen signs that the world can unite to fight the Covid-19 pandemic; vaccine development has shown that, but more needs to be done. My heart was lifted to read of ventilators, oxygen concentrators and other medical supplies being

sent from many countries to help out in India. Christian Aid are already working with the most vulnerable communities, let us reach out our hands and help them in their work, joining in in a 'universal song of love.'

I am delighted that each week now I am seeing new faces in church, or perhaps I should say old faces returning once more. It may be some time before our numbers can increase above 50 due to the size of our building, but I look forward to meeting more of you when out and about, or in your gardens. Please speak to me and introduce yourself if I don't recognise you – face masks and sunglasses are a hazardous combination for recognition!

Yippee!!! Brownies are back to meeting face to face!!


After 8 months of meeting virtually, we were able to return to meeting outdoors last week. The sun shone on us and we had our maximum number of 15 joining in the fun.

Word Mission Update

India Prayer Request

India's tally of recorded coronavirus cases exceeds 12 million, the second-highest in the world. The pandemic, which has spoiled economies and burdened medical infrastructure, worsened at the end of February in India and the country has since been reporting record Covid-19 cases every day. On 20 April this year, India had 295,158 new Covid-19 infections, according to World Health Organisation data.

The General Secretary of the Church of South India writes: "We earnestly solicit your active prayers and timely accompaniment with us to combat the adverse situation. The Church must ensure the availability of vaccines, basic food, interim financial support, and other necessary missional accompaniment with the people, especially the most vulnerable."

As a responsible and accountable body, the Church of Scotland cannot be passive and ignore the vital issues. The Church must be serving as a centre of courage and hope to the people without any discrimination. We do strongly believe that it is the prophetic role of the Church to address the vital issues which severely affect people's lives and livelihoods.



Prayer Request from Bangladesh

Rt Rev Samuel Mankhin, Bishop of Dhaka, has written about the second Covid-19 wave which has hit Bangladesh.

He writes: "At the moment, we are going through the second nationwide lockdown, which started from 14 April and will continue till 21 April. There is every possibility of extending the period of lockdown. All the project activities have been stopped, yet church services are going on maintaining the social distance and with safe measures [in place]." In the past week, Bangladesh reported 47,392 new cases; a 13% increase compared to last week. The country also reported 473 new deaths; a 30% increase.

Bishop Mankhin continues, "A good number of Christian people have passed away due to Covid-19 and many are still fighting to survive with the situation, having lost their jobs and businesses. As a result, the Church of Bangladesh is becoming helpless to support these families during their crisis period.

"We keep them all in God's gracious hand and believe that He will grant His blessings for those families. We have closed our offices and are working remotely from our residences. We request you to uphold Bangladesh and our Church in your prayers. We believe at some stage, God will heal the world from Covid-19 and we all will be able to join hand in hand to praise our Lord the Saviour."
