### From the manse

As I write this letter, it is Thursday 18th May. I wonder if the day means anything to you? I suspect, unless it's your birthday, or the birthday or anniversary of someone in your family, it probably passed just like any other Thursday. However, in Germany, where my daughter lives, it is a national holiday. Now, the Germans don't come across as a particularly religious people - more than likely, you might think of Italy and Spain as being religious, but not really Germany. But that day marks the Ascension of Christ into heaven. It's not a big day in our church calendar and certainly not in our society. It doesn't rate in most people's reckoning, but in German it is a national holiday, called Christi Himmelfahrt – literally Christ's Heaven Journey. (And if you are interested, the Germans have another national holiday for Pentecost.)

We do note the significance of Christ's ascension every time we say the Creed together, for after we say, "On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures", we add, "He ascended into heaven and is seated on the right hand of the Father". But perhaps we say these words without thinking about them too much.

For Jesus and his Disciples Ascension was an important, noteworthy day. Over the previous 40 days he had made many postresurrection appearances to his disciples and other followers. He showed them the wounds in his hands and his side; he told them where to fish for a better catch of fish; he cooked fish on the beach for them and spent a lot of time teaching them about the Kingdom of God, re-emphasising things he had spoken about before, but that they hadn't grasped on first telling. And now the big day had come, with no warning or fanfare. The big event that marks the end of Jesus' earthly ministry.

Although he won't be physically present with the disciples anymore, Jesus promises that this is not the end, but the



beginning of a new chapter in God's story. And he is with us always. In an amazing way that we can't quite explain, try as we might, the Son of God, went up a mountain with his disciples, and disappeared up into the clouds, and because he did, he is with us always. No longer confined to one time or one place. Jesus is always with us. His breath is in the air that surrounds us. his sweat and tears in every river, sea and rainbow. His voice is in all who cry out in need. And yet his body is in every piece of bread shared with the hungry, his love shown in every well dug, every water pump provided, every toilet that is twinned. His words of peace, spoken to frightened disciples are for us too. A gift to heal our heartache, a prayer phrase to recite, God's peace within us turns darkness into light. We are called to share Christ's peace. However life is threatened, his peace demands we care and we share it with others.

The response of Jesus' followers was to worship him. "And they worshiped him (on the mountain top) and returned to Jerusalem with great joy, and were continually in the temple blessing God." (Luke 24:51-53)
They continued praising God for what he had done. Their lives overflowed with joy and praise – and with obedience. Jesus told them "Behold, I am sending the promise of my Father upon you. But stay in the city until you are clothed with power from on high." (Luke 24:49). And that's exactly what they did. It is as you focus on him, that you will be moved to joyful worship and your obedience will follow.

Jesus Christ is the focus of our worship, the object of our worship and the source of our joy. He deserves our obedience. If you are finding it hard to worship, lacking joy, or struggling with obedience, fix your eyes on Jesus, the author and perfector of our faith.

As we move into summer may you find joy in the risen, ascended Christ, may your hearts be moved to worship and your minds to obey.

## **Illegal Immigration Bill**

Many of you will have noted with outrage the proposals outlined in the so called 'Illegal Migration Bill' by the UK Government. If passed, almost all people arriving in the UK to seek safety will be detained, punished and removed without their claim for asylum even being heard. There is little to no evidence to suggest this new plan will be an effective deterrent to people crossing the Channel in small boats. The Home Office's own research shows that measures such as this new Bill do not remove the reasons why people undertake dangerous and difficult journeys to the UK and other places.

Many church leaders and charities have condemned this Bill for breaking international law and the UNHCR comments: "The legislation, if passed, would amount to an asylum ban – extinguishing the right to seek refugee protection in the United Kingdom for those who arrive irregularly, no matter how compelling their claim may be."

As people of faith you might want to express your concerns to your MP or join the Joint Public Issues Team and 1500 other church leaders in standing against the legislation.

Our church worker, Peter, has been very busy and held a most successful Easter Club with 85 children attending over the week. He continues to liaise with Ralston Primary School and was away in Lockerbie with a group of P7 pupils and their teachers for a few days earlier this month.

The Christian Education Group has another booklet for uplift - Thy Kingdom Come - following on the success of Try Praying.

These can be collected from the church and are in the form of a prayer journal. Give these a go - they are worth the effort. Prayer can be very helpful in most situations.




Before that we should be attending the special GirlGuiding showing of *The Little Mermaid*. The badges are bought, the pop corn is at the ready; we just need the tickets.

If you would like to volunteer with Girl Guiding, follow these 3 simple steps.

To register your child, it is a 4-step process and here is how it works.

- Register your interest fill out our form and give your details.
   We need to know where you are based and how we can contact you.
- 2. We'll be in touch someone from the Girlguiding team in your area will contact you for a chat, usually within seven days.
- 3. Tell us what you want to do during this chat let us know about
  your skills and how much time you
  have to spare. This will help us to
  find the right volunteer role for you
  and start our recruitment check
  process.

- Register your interest we'll ask for your contact details and a few key pieces of information about your child.
- 2. Choose the best unit for you we'll use your details to suggest several local units. Then it's up to you to choose the most convenient one. You can select up to 3 choices.
- 3. We'll get in touch someone from your chosen unit will contact you. They'll aim to get back to you within 3 weeks. They can explain to you about meetings times, costs, what's planned for the term and if there's a waiting list.
- 4. Try guiding out if spaces are available, the unit will arrange a trial meeting for your child to attend. This gives you both an idea of what guiding is all about we're sure you'll love it!





### **Celtic Saints - Saint Mungo**

Saint Mungo, also known as Saint Kentigern, (mostly in England and Wales), lived from 528 to 13 January 614. He is the patron saint and founder of the City of Glasgow.

According to the Life of Saint Mungo written by the monk, Jocelin of Furness, in about 1185, Mungo's mother was Princess Theneva daughter of Loth, the King of the Gododdin, who ruled an area centred on today's East Lothian. After an illicit encounter with her cousin, the young King Owain of North Rheged, now part of Galloway, Princess Theneva fell pregnant. Her unamused father had her tied to a chariot and launched off Traprain Law. It miraculously landed softly, hurting neither Theneva nor her unborn child. The Gododdin, now believing Theneva also to be a witch, then cast her adrift in a coracle without oars on the River Forth. She drifted up-river and came ashore at Culross in Fife, where Kentigern was born.

Kentigern was given the pet name Mungo, meaning something like "dear one", by St Serf, who ran a monastery at Culross and took in both mother and son. St Serf then oversaw Mungo's upbringing. At the age of 25, Mungo began his missionary work on the banks of the River Clyde. Here he was welcomed by people previously converted to Christianity by St Ninian, and here Mungo built his church, close to the confluence of the River Clyde and the Molendinar Burn. Since the 1200s, the site of this early church has formed part of Glasgow Cathedral.

Mungo worked on the banks of the River Clyde for 13 years until the anti-Christian King Morken of Strathclyde drove him out in about AD565. Mungo made his way through Cumbria to Wales, where he spent time with St David, possibly founded a cathedral at



St Asaph, and even found time for a pilgrimage to Rome. But in the 570s King Rhydderch Hael of Strathclyde, having overthrown Morken, invited Mungo to become Archbishop of Strathclyde.

Mungo initially based himself in northern Galloway. In August 584 Mungo is said to have converted the bard Merlin to Christianity near the site of a church he later founded: Stobo Kirk.

Mungo later returned to the River Clyde, where his church became the focus of a large community that became known as Clas-gu or 'dear family'. From these beginnings emerged the modern city of Glasgow. It was at Clas-gu that Mungo was visited by Saint Columba, who at the time was working as a missionary in central Scotland. He is said to have died in his bath on Sunday 13 January, 614. He was buried close by his church, and today his tomb lies in the centre of the Lower Choir of Glasgow Cathedral, probably on the actual site of his grave.

In order to make someone a Saint, it was necessary to prove that the candidate had performed miracles during their lifetime. St Mungo was said to have performed four, referred to in a poem:

Here is the bird that never flew Here is the tree that never grew Here is the bell that never rang Here is the fish that never swam.



The Bird commemorates the pet robin owned by St Serf, which was accidentally killed by monks who blamed it on Kentigern. Kentigern took the bird in his hands and prayed over it, restoring it to life again.

The Tree is the symbol of another incident in Kentigern's childhood. Left in charge of the holy fire in St Serf's monastery, he fell asleep and the fire went out. However, he broke off some frozen branches from a hazel tree and miraculously rekindled the fire.

The Bell he brought home from Rome, and may have been given to Kentigern by the Pope. The original bell, which was tolled at funerals, no longer exists and was replaced by the magistrates of Glasgow in 1641. The bell of 1641 is preserved in the People's Palace.

The Fish was a special catch caught in the Clyde. Queen Languoreth of Cadzow was accused of infidelity by her husband, King Riderich, who alleged she had given her wedding ring to her lover when, in reality, the king had himself thrown it into the river. Facing execution, the Queen appealed to St Mungo, who ordered a servant to catch a fish from the river. When the fish was cut open, the ring was found inside, demonstrating the Queen's innocence.

Today the bird, tree, bell and fish form the four elements of the crest of Glasgow City Council. St Mungo is also responsible for the motto of his city, based on his original prayer: "Lord let Glasgow flourish through the preaching of thy word and praising thy name." Since 1699 this has been shortened to "Let Glasgow flourish".
